How do I enter the fair?

WHAT IS THE FAIR?

The Park County Fair is an opportunity for 4-H and FFA youth to exhibit completed projects they have been enrolled in for the current 4-H year. The exhibits are judged and members presented ribbons—purple, blue, red or white, along with premium money for these exhibits. Special rosettes and plaques are awarded in some classes.

WHO CAN EXHIBIT?

All 4-H and FFA members affiliated in good standing with an organized club or FFA chapter qualify to exhibit at the fair. Cloverbuds may only exhibit indoor cloverbud projects and a chicken or rabbit. **Members must be enrolled in project by April 30th of current 4-H year to enter and meet their project requirements.**

WHAT I CAN ENTER?

This 4-H Fair Book lists all the information needed to enter your 4-H projects in the Park County Fair. The table of contents provides you with a list of all projects and page numbers. The Fair Book lists the **DEPARTMENT, CLASS and LOT NUMBER(S)** for items that can be exhibited at the Park County Fair. The Fair Book also lists the rules and regulations pertaining to your entry including size of exhibit or number of exhibits that can be entered. It gives the time your entries must arrive at the fair, the time they can be released, and the **schedule of events**. Entry forms are available from the Park County Extension Office, or your FFA advisor.

HOW DO I ENTER?

To enter the 4-H Division of the Park County Fair, you must submit a completed ENTRY FORM to the Park County Extension Office, 414 East Callender, Livingston, MT 59047, by Wednesday, June 22, 2011 (or have envelope postmarked by this date).

IF ENTRIES ARE LATE, A \$10.00 LATE FEE PER MEMBER WILL BE ASSESSED. NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER JULY 1st 2011.

WHAT CAN I ENTER IN THE PARK COUNTY FAIR SALE?

The Park County Fair Sale will be held Friday at 6:00 pm. All 4-H and FFA members will be allowed to sell two red, blue, or purple ribbon market animals, Made-In-4-H items or a combination of the two. Members may not sell any projects receiving a white ribbon. For example, you may sell two market hogs or one market hog and one photograph or two photographs. Only one steer per member may be sold. Beef members may sell one steer and a heifer or one steer and a hog or lamb or one steer and an indoor item or two heifers. Sale pay weight will be the fair weigh-in weight. Maximum sale pay weights are listed for each species under their specific department. If the animal exceeds the maximum sale pay weight limit, the sale pay weight limit will be used as the animal's weight. **All livestock sold through the ring must be previously designated for sale on the fair entry form. Made-in-4-H/FFA items must be signed-up with the 4-H Office.** See the general 4-H fair schedule for Made-In-4-H sale item sign-up times. Private sale of market animals prior to the Park County Fair Sale is prohibited. The exchange of any animal designated for sale, before or after the Livestock Sale, is prohibited. Members must be present to sell their market animals.

New 2011 Fairbook Changes

Bull's Eye Program

In an effort to improve animal welfare during the fair, a BULLSEYE program will be implemented. Previously, some project members did not provide adequate care for their animals and livestock committees could not reach the member to remedy the problem. The BULLSEYE is our attempt to remedy this.

If a livestock project member is deficient in the care of their animal at the fair, a BULLSEYE will be placed on the pen. The member will have no more than 6 hours to contact the livestock committee chairperson. The project superintendent's number will be on the BULLSEYE. If you do not have access to a phone, find a Park County Extension Agent and they will put you in contact with the appropriate superintendent.

Once connection between the member and the livestock committee chairperson has been made, the member will be instructed on how to remedy the inadequate care of their animal. In the event a member does not contact the livestock committee within the allotted 6 hours, or does not perform the remedy as directed by the livestock committee, the member will be asked to take the animal home and they will be disqualified from showing or selling their animal.

Exhibitor Dress Code

Unless otherwise noted in your project area dress code, **all members** participating in livestock shows, indoor interviews and the fair sale will wear blue or black jeans without holes, rips or stains. All members will wear leather boots or closed-toe shoes and a nice shirt. Any members wearing tank tops, t-shirts, belly shirts, sleeveless shirts, tennis shoes (when exhibiting livestock), sandals, flip flops, crocks, and muck boots will be asked to change.

Showmanship now required in the following animal classes

All members exhibiting market swine or market sheep will be required to participate in the showmanship class.

Minimum Swine Weight Change

The minimum market swine weight was raised from 205 to 230 pounds. Only market hogs weighing 230 pounds and over will be permitted to sell at the Park County Fair Sale. Market hogs weighing less than 230 pounds will be shown, but not sold.

Fair Schedule Changes

There have been major changes to the Park County 4-H Fair schedule. Please refer to the schedule at the back of this book for those changes.

4-H Entry into Open Class

4-H members can now enter their 4-H fair projects into the open class fair as well. Contact Kim Knutson at the Park County Fairgrounds for open class fair entry information.

GRIEVANCE POLICY PROCEDURES

A Park County 4-H Conflict Resolution Team provides timely assistance to the County Extension Office in cases where violations of the Code of Conduct have occurred and/or disciplinary action of a 4-H member or leader may be required. The Team shall provide fair and reasonable recommendations for any action to be taken. A majority vote will recommend any necessary action. The Conflict Resolution Team may be convened by the Extension Agent, the 4-H member or leader involved, or his/her parents. A formal letter of complaint must be registered with the County Extension Agent within 30 days of the incident. The Team shall be called together in a timely manner to discuss any registered complaint. The County Agent will have final discretion on all grievances.

FAIR-RELATED INCIDENT

The team shall consist of seven (7) unbiased members: Two (2) adult members of the 4-H Council Executive Committee, the (1) Extension Agent (facilitator), one (1) member of the Teen Leader Council, the (1) appropriate department superintendent, as well as two (2) Fair board members, or a Fair board member and Fair manager. The Teen Leader Council member and the superintendent shall be named by the 4-H Council President.

RESOLUTION STEPS TO TAKE

1. A written statement of grievance shall be filed by the party (ies) grieving the process or decision. The statement should include the following information at a minimum:
 - The date of the incident;
 - The name(s) of the people filing the grievance;
 - A complete statement describing the incident including all facts upon which the complaint is based;
 - Any rules, regulations, policies or procedures that have been violated, if any;
 - List of the names and addresses (preferably with phone numbers) of people who have been involved in the incident and their role in it; and
 - Signatures of those submitting the grievance.
2. The written grievance must be submitted to the County Extension Agent.

4-H Members Code Of Conduct

You are representing your county. What others think of you is often based upon first impressions of behavior and dress. It is not possible to anticipate every potential situation. In the absence of a rule regarding a specific activity or situation, common sense should prevail. **Violation of any of these rules may be grounds for the dismissal of individuals or groups. Infractions will be dealt with through the 4-H Conflict Resolution Team.**

Every 4-H member is expected to observe the following rules:

1. Be pleasant and cooperative.
2. Respect supervision at all times. You are responsible to adult leaders while participating in all 4-H activities.
3. Fireworks, illegal drugs, all tobacco products and intoxicants of any kind, as well as weapons (as defined in Park County Ordinance Number 13) are prohibited.
4. Discrimination, harassment and / or physical force of any kind will not be tolerated.
5. Respect for facilities, natural surroundings and the property of others is compulsory, i.e.: projects, animals and personal possessions included.
6. Respect the privacy of others.
7. Be punctual for all scheduled events.

RODEO SENIOR PRINCESS AND JUNIOR PRINCESS CONTEST

Every year at the Park County 4-H/FFA Rodeo the 4-H Council crowns a Junior and/or Senior member (depending on number and ages of contestants) to be the Senior and Junior Princesses of the fair. This contest is open to any 4-H member in good standing exhibiting at the Park County Fair. The contest will consist of a horsemanship pattern, modeling, impromptu questions, and riding in the Livingston Roundup Parade. There will be a \$20.00 entry fee for all contestants. The junior and senior winner will receive a sash, a crown, and a belt buckle.



Entry forms will not be accepted unless signed by both the contestant and his or her parent or guardian. Entry forms will not be accepted without \$20.00 entry fee enclosed.

Duties of Jr. Princess & Sr. Princesses: Present ribbons at the Market Beef, Swine and Sheep show the Round Robin showmanship classes, the Champion of Champion contest and help during the Livestock Sale, while wearing your crown and sash. Help the following year contestants at their competition, help with Fashion Review, and ride in the following year's Livingston parade with your sash and crown.

General Rules

GENERAL RULES APPLYING TO ALL CLOVERBUDS

Cloverbuds may exhibit “Cloverbud” Projects at the Park County 4-H Fair. Cloverbuds may exhibit poultry and/or rabbits on the day of the show. Cloverbuds are not eligible to participate in the 4-H Rodeo or in fundraising activities.

GENERAL RULES APPLYING TO 4-H EXHIBITORS

1. The Park County 4-H Fair is a subset of the Park County Fair. All general Park County Fair rules apply to any and all 4-H exhibits and 4-H exhibitors. Please refer to the Park County Fairbook for further information.
2. All nondairy livestock and small animal exhibits must be in place by 5 pm on Wednesday.
3. Only one item per lot can be entered, unless otherwise stated in project area.
4. The Fair Board assumes no responsibility for loss or damage to any exhibit during the progress of the Fair, or while en route to or from the Fair. However, due care will be exercised to prevent loss or damage.
5. All persons participating in the Fair agree to make no legal claim against the Park County Fair Board, or any person acting for or through the Fair for loss, damage or injury to property, animal or person.
6. **No exhibit shall be removed prior to 5:00 pm, Saturday** without loss of premium money. All inside exhibits must be removed by 6 pm. Any exception to this rule will require written permission from the Fair Manager.
7. Any items left at the fair will be held at the Extension Office for one week.
8. Because of availability of equipment, members may make projects using school facilities, if intentions are made known to 4-H leader.

LIVESTOCK SHOWMANSHIP REGULATIONS

SHOWMANSHIP DRESS CODE

See dress code in your project area: If no dress code is stated for your project, use the proper dress code below:

All members participating in scheduled 4-H fair activities (ex. livestock shows, indoor interviews, the fair sale, etc.) will wear blue or black jeans without holes, rips or stains. All members will wear boots or appropriate closed-toed shoes and a nice shirt.

4-H members wearing tank tops, t-shirts, belly shirts, sleeveless shirts, sandals, flip flops, crocks, or muck boots will be asked to change.

SHOWMANSHIP WILL BE JUDGED ON THE FOLLOWING:

20 Points: Quality of Fitting; well fitted, clean animal to the ability of the exhibitor

40 Points: Quality of Showing; proper control of animal and showing animal correctly

25 Points: Proper dress; dark pants, light colored dress or western shirt, appropriate foot wear

15 Points: Appropriate show equipment for animal showing; halter, stick or cane, comb or brush

- There are two divisions in the showmanship contest, **LARGE ANIMAL DIVISION & SMALL ANIMAL DIVISION**. Both animal divisions will be divided into three (3) age groups. Age is determined as of the first of October of the current 4-H year.

Juniors: 9 through 10 years of age

Advanced Juniors: 11 through 13 years of age

- The top two Showmen from both the Junior and Advanced Junior Showmanship Classes will have a show off to determine the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion of these two junior age groups (4 showman total). These four showmen will show against each other to determine the Grand Champion Junior Showman and Reserve Champion Junior Showman in each species.
- 4-H and FFA members must exhibit in the showmanship class in which their animal is entered.

Seniors: Age 14 and over

- 4-H and FFA members must exhibit in the showmanship class in which their animal is entered.
- Showman must enter the ring prepared to show their fitted animals.
- Market Sheep Showmanship: Halters are not recommended but are allowed for junior sheep showman. Senior sheep showman **cannot** use halters.

ROUND ROBIN SHOWMANSHIP:

- **The Junior Round Robin Showmanship** contest will consist of members 13 years of age and under as of October 1, of the current year. (**See bold note in Showmanship Regulations above)
- **The Senior Round Robin Showmanship** contest will consist of members 14 years of age and older as of

October 1, of the current year.

- The previous years' Senior and Junior winners of Round Robins are **NOT ELIGIBLE TO ENTER** the Round Robin Competition. They are still eligible to win Grand or Reserve in their respective Showmanship Classes.
- The third place showman advances if Grand and Reserve have previously won Round Robin.
- In case of a tie in the Round Robin Showmanship Competition, two first place awards will be given. Presentation will be at Achievement Night.
- If there is no Showman for a specific species, that animal class will be represented in the Round Robin Contest if an animal is exhibited at the Fair and the owner of the animal agrees.
- Large Animal Junior and Senior Round Robin Showmanship are done simultaneously.
- If a member qualifies for both Large and Small Animal Round Robin, they must choose which event they will participate in.
- If animals become unruly or unsafe an animal substitution may occur.

GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES

Stalls, Bedding, and Fitting Information

- Only 4-H and FFA members will be permitted to fit and care for 4-H and FFA animals unless good reason is presented for the necessity of other arrangements. 4-H and FFA animals will be judged together.
- Livestock exhibitors must bring the following supplies: feed, show equipment, feed troughs, grooming supplies, water pails, tools used for feeding, halters, tools used for clean-up.
- Stalls must be kept clean at all times by the 4-H member. The Herdsmanship Awards will be based on neatness of stall and alleys, care and grooming of animals, promptness in showing, care of equipment, courtesy to visitors, herdsman's business-like attitude and cooperation.
- Bedding for all animals will be provided by the Park County Fair Board.
- It is recommended that tie-outs be used during the nighttime hours for beef. Neck ropes must be used when cattle are stalled indoors.
- No water fights during the fair, either indoors or outdoors.

Weigh-In Information

- Market livestock will be weighed in one time only for Fair weight. See the General 4-H Fair Schedule for weigh-in times.

Animal Treatment Information

- Proper care and treatment of all animals at the Fair is **MANDATORY**. Non-compliance with this rule is subject to disciplinary action at the discretion of the Superintendent and/or the Conflict Resolution Team.

Parking Information

- Designated parking for trucks and trailers shall be determined by the Fair Board.

Sale Photos and Fees Information

- All Market Animal & Made in 4-H Sale members must have their photographs taken with their market animal and Made in 4-H sale item during the Fair for Buyer's Thank You posters. Photo schedule will be posted in all barns and in the 4-H Fair Office.
- Brand inspection fees for the Livestock Sale shall be subtracted from member's sale checks.

PROJECT DEPARTMENTS:

ANIMAL SCIENCE – A

BEEF – DEPARTMENT - A01

Locke Creek Ranch Inc, owned and operated by the Larkin family will award a commercial steer or heifer calf to the Grand Champion Market Beef exhibitor. The winner will choose the calf from the herd during shipping this fall. The calf must be displayed at the following year's fair. After displayed at the following year's fair, the calf may be sold or added to the owner's herd. If the Grand Champion winner is unable to accept the prize, it will go to the Reserve Champion.

Definitions:

Bucket Calf: any spring born calf less than one year of age who was primarily raised on a bottle or bucket.

Orphan Calf: any spring born calf less than one year of age who was raised by a cow not who was not its mother.

All sexually intact cattle must comply with all USDA/APHIS and Montana Department of Livestock requirements and livestock owners must provide appropriate paperwork for proof of compliance to the Extension Agent prior to stalling at the fair. This may include, but is not limited to, requirements relating to movement and sale of cattle from the designated surveillance area (DSA) for brucellosis.

CLASS 1 - MARKET BEEF

- Entries are limited to steers and spayed heifers of any breed. Animals must be in possession, owned and fed by the exhibitor from the initial weigh-in through the Park County Fair.
- Proof of ownership (ex. a brand inspection or in family transfer situations a bill of sale) must accompany animal at initial weigh-in and be turned in at fair weigh-in.
- All animal weights will be determined during the 4-H fair weigh-in. Please refer to the general 4-H schedule for the exact time. Market steers and spayed heifers must weigh a minimum of 1000 pounds. Any market animal under that weight will be shown, but not sold. Steers and spayed heifers over weighing over 1400 pounds may be shown. Their sale pay weight will be 1400 pounds. Lowline or lowline cross steers must weigh a minimum of 750 pounds.
- Skillathon and beef requirements are **mandatory** to exhibit your animal at the fair in the 4-H/FFA classes.
- All participants must be in safe control of their market steer/heifer during the entire fair. Animals not in "safe" control will be shown in the barn and will not be eligible for Grand or Reserve Champion Awards. Safe control will be monitored during weigh-in and determined by the

majority of the beef committee.

Animals must be entered in one correct breed class and one lot listed below. All animals will be judged upon breed type and characteristics, quality, and development for age. Registration papers are not required.

LOT 1– Heifers, Calved on or after January 1, of the current year (**MPB**)

LOT 2– Heifers, Calved Aug 1—Dec 31, of last year (**MPB**)

- LOT 3– Heifers, Yearlings (**HPB**)
- LOT 4 - Bulls, Calves, calved on or after January 1, of current year (**MPB**)
- LOT 5 - Bulls, Calves, calved August - December of last year (**MPB**)
- LOT 6 - Bulls, Yearlings, (**HPB**)
- LOT 7 - Bulls, 2 Yrs Old, (**HPB**)
- LOT 8 – Prodigy of Dam (2 or more) (**HPB**)
- LOT 9 – Replacement Sale Heifer Project (**MPB**) (possession date, initial beef weigh-in, must bring proof of being bred)
- LOT 10 – Cow / Calf Pair (both need to be halter broke, will be shown on the grass). (**HPB**)
- LOT 11– Pen Show – Cow/Calf Pair Pen Show (**HPB**)
Pen Show will consist of cow and calf exhibited with educational poster including such items as cow weight, calf weight, age of dam and calf, plus any other items of interest, the pair need not be halter broken to be shown in the pen. Judging will be determined by 1/3 on the poster, 1/3 on the interview, and 1/3 on the cow-calf pair.

SHOWMANSHIP

(Any beef project animal may be used).

Showmanship Dress: Black pants, white or light colored shirt with collar, leather boots, tie or black scarf, show stick, and scotch comb are required.

- Goats are to have milk teeth or may have lost one or both of the milk teeth, but there shall be no evidence of permanent front teeth.
- All Market Goats must have a Scrapie Tag.
- Showmanship dress should be appropriate to the species and follow rules of the fair.

The champions from each market goat category will compete for Overall Grand Champion Market Goat. Project participants may select a doe or whether for their market animal, intact males are not eligible. Does entered into the market class are not eligible for any other class (i.e. breeding does, dairy, etc.) Goats do not have to be registered to be sold or shown. Any breed is eligible for market classes; however a meat type breed, like a Boer or Boer-cross, will typically perform better than a dairy or fiber breed in market conformation. Only pygmy or pygmy cross goats will be allowed to show in the light breed class and must be a minimum of 45 lbs. at fair weigh in to sale.

Market goats must have their milk teeth prior to the fair.
Market goats must be weighed and tagged with the sheep.

Park County Fair Rules and Guidelines

1. Due to safety reasons, horses cannot be ridden in barns or parking areas of the Park County Fairgrounds. Stay behind the beef barns when going to and from the arena.
2. Horses are not to be ridden off the Fairgrounds Property.
3. Horses will be walked in all areas outside the arena, other than warm up areas.
4. Horses are not to be ridden after dark outside of the arena. They must be led from the arena to the barn.
5. No riding double at the fairgrounds.
6. Horses are not to be left tied or unattended on the fairgrounds property, with the exception of members working with their horses in horse barns, pens or the arena.

7.

Stalling and Barn Information

8. Stalling during the Park County Fair is mandatory, per the Park County Fair Board, and no premiums will be issued to members who do not stall. It is permissible by obtaining permission of the **Fair Board and the Horse Committee in advance** to take horses' home from 9:00 pm to 9:00 am.
9. Barn Steward: Each family is responsible for filling a "Barn Steward" shift during the fair. Signups will be made at Pre-Fair.
10. No two horses may be in any one stall at any one time.
11. Only horses with a Colt/Horse ID card on file will be allowed to stall in the barn.
12. 4-H Members are responsible for their stall being cleaned out and fresh water and feed provided to their horses during the fair by 9:00 am and 9:00 pm respectively. Water hoses are to be put away when not in use. Water buckets are to be tied so they will not spill. Stall cards must be filled out daily.
13. **Exhibitors are expected to Strip their stall, and clean their area prior to leaving the Fairgrounds, or they will be charged a stall cleaning fee of \$50.00, and have**

their premium withheld.

Show Rules:

1. Stallions are not allowed to show at the County or State show.
2. Member must have been assessed on the horse they bring to the fair. (So assess on both horses if you have registered more than one). Horses may be checked at the 4-H fair by the veterinarians and any horse not in good health will be sent home.
3. No person other than the exhibitors and show officials will be allowed in the ring while the show is in progress.
4. Horses must enter and exit the arena in a controlled forward motion.
5. No abuse or unnecessary spurring jerking or roughness will be allowed.
6. A horse carried as a 4-H Horsemanship Levels project may be shown by more than one member of the immediate family in any one year at the County Show, State Fair, and State Horse Show, providing that neither the horse nor the member competes against himself. If there is a conflict in schedules for any reason, the exhibitor will have to determine which class to participate and scratch the other.
7. Members may ride at only one level English and / or one level Western. If riding both Western and English, levels ridden can be the same level or only one level above or below.
8. The Horse Superintendent has the option of combining or deleting classes.
9. The Park County Fair will be the qualifying show for the State 4-H Horse show.
10. The judge's decision in all classes shall be final.
11. A minimum of 3 Park County 4-H clinics as well as Pre-Fair must be attended to be eligible to show at the Park County Fair, unless exception is granted by the horse committee. A written Skillathon will be required during the Large Animal Skillathon Night for all project members. Subject matter will be level appropriate.

Rules Regarding Proper Tack

1. In accordance with State 4-H Horse Show Rules, it is mandatory that Western Horses five (5) years and over be ridden one handed in a shank bit. A snaffle bit or rawhide noseband hackamore (bosal) will be acceptable for horses through four (4) years of age.
2. Horses in English classes may show in Pelham, Weymouth, or snaffle bits.
3. Tie-downs are not permitted.
4. No wire curb straps and no chin strap narrower than one-half inch will be permitted. Flat braided chain curb straps one half inch or wider will be permitted.
5. Although not required, ASTM F1163/DEI Helmets are strongly recommended for use not only during horse shows, but also during clinics.
6. Appropriate riding boots must be worn when riding.
7. All horses must be ridden with bridles. No halters.
8. Run irons must be used on English saddles.
9. Spurs are not allowed at any time when riding bareback.
10. A white ribbon will be automatic for unacceptable horse equipment. (Exceptions to this rule must be approved by

the Park County Horse Committee for county projects only).

Dress Code Requirements

Exhibitors and judges should bear in mind that at all times, entries are being judged on ability. However, neatness is the first requisite regarding a rider's attire, and the following requirements are based on tradition and general present-day customs. In the case of inclement weather, the judge may allow coats, rain gear or appropriate adjustments.

Boots are required at all times when riding.

Western Horsemanship Levels 1-7:

Long sleeved white blouse or shirt, with black scarf, tie or pin at the neck; black western style pants, belt, and clean western style boots, approved safety helmet or western style hat, clean and in good condition. Hair shoulder length or longer must be contained in a net or braid. Vests, sweaters, chaps, gloves and jackets are prohibited. Spurs are optional.

English Horsemanship Levels 1-7:

English style solid color coat (not red) is optional, breeches or jodhpurs, white English style blouse or shirt with pin at the neck (long sleeved if no jacket is worn), clean paddock boots, field boots or dress boots, helmet meeting ASTM and SEI standards with chin strap fastened. Hair shoulder length or longer must be contained in a net or braid. Stocks, chokers or ties optional, gloves, spurs without rowels, and crop or bat are optional.

Showmanship, Halter, Colt to Maturity and Green Horse Classes:

- All poultry **must** be dusted two weeks before fair entry day.
- Poultry entries are limited to two entries per lot.
- Poultry will be inspected by Poultry Committee on entry day for general health conditions. If any poultry is in poor health or injured, they will not be accepted for display or judged.
- Cages, straw, and water will be provided. Exhibitor must bring carrying cages and feed, provide feed at least twice daily, and keep water available at all times.
- Exhibitor must see superintendent before placing poultry in cages. Superintendents will have exhibit cards attached to each cage.
- Entries will be placed by classes and lots for best public viewing and judging rather than by clubs. All birds must remain in assigned cages.
- Please bring your workbook to your project interview.
- Birds will be entered as individuals or a trio (trio consist of one male and two females of same breed). Birds entered as trio may not compete as individuals, or vice versa.
- No baby birds are allowed.

- Each exhibitor must accompany their bird during judging or the bird will not be judged.
- Each exhibitor must clean and fold and stack cages prior to exhibit removal. No poultry will be removed before 5:00 PM on fair closing day and must be removed by 6 PM. Exhibits not picked up by that time are not the responsibility of superintendents or fair board.
- Superintendent's decisions on rule interpretations or amendments, safety, bird protection, breeds, ages, lots, cage use, placement within the building, sale removals, awards and all other related matters will be final. If contested, please refer to the grievance policy on page 10.
